From the latest BSSRS Bulletin (November, 1984), in a report from the Agricapital Group, by Tim Lang:

"Currently, the politics of food is reemerging on the political agenda for the first time in 40 years. This is, in my humble opinion, not unconnected with the recession. The 'Look After Yourself' healthy eating neurosis bears strong resemblance to what happened in the 1930's. This time, however, the Left has failed to look beyond the bland experts' assurances that people have enough to eat. This is where the contradictions of the anti fats, salt, sugar and lack of fibre argument come in. These issues ... are commonly seen as the 'problems of affluence'. But look around you, have you noticed (Rad Stats, back me here please) that not everyone is 'average'. As unemployment grows, benefits are tightened and taxed... Meanwhile a middle class attack on food processors misses the political and economic reality that it is retailers who call the tune in the UK food system..."
