Communication from the Troika – Keeping in touch

Here are a few ideas, but we would welcome more from you.

There is a lively debate on the <u>RADSTATS@jiscmail.ac.uk</u>, and we would like volunteers to come forward to collate and summarise these interchanges on various issues for publication in the newsletter.

Our website is a big asset. It is an excellent shop-window for Radical Statistics. Recent additions include a paper produced by Policy Press on inequalities in the UK, and Ludi Simpson's audio file 'Where Have All the Young Men Gone?' (Census programme). We want more of these. Should we have a contact list and profiles of members on the site?

The troika intends to make our new recruitment leaflet gather more information about members, to build up a network of those with like interests. This could result in more subgroups that could hold meetings or make contact through email. The existing subgroups are listed inside the front cover of the newsletter but may need more support. There is a good case, following recently announced government initiatives, for renewed activity within the Education subgroup. There are other challenges to government policy in health care that should keep the Health subgroup busy. Please let us have your suggestions.

Call for applications for the post of Administrator to the Radical Statistics Group

The work of the Radical Statistics Group (RSG) would be impossible without administrative help. Pete Latarche was our administrator until January 2004, when David Symes took over. Since then, David has served the group with enthusiasm, but unfortunately because of ill-heath and the pressure of other commitments, he is having to stand down.

The Troika is grateful to David that he has agreed to help us until March 2006. We hope to have a new administrator appointed by January 2006, to give a period of overlap that will help the new person learn the organisational details. Therefore applications are needed by the <u>end of December 2005</u>.

The applicant should share the aims of the group, which is more important than having a technical knowledge of statistics. This is a self-employed position, where day-to-day direction comes from the Troika (currently four), who resolve any problems that arise. You must be confident about keeping clear records, on computer and on paper as appropriate, and about being generally reliable and efficient. Note that the RSG does not have an office, so you need to provide your own physical workspace and liaise with Troika members largely by email or telephone.

There are three main aspects of the work:

- maintaining the membership database (set up on Access), monitoring the payment of subscriptions, and following up associated problems,
- as administrative contact, dealing with enquiries and organising the bookings to attend the annual conference,
- journal printing and distribution; the group publishes three newsletters per year. (This normally requires liaison with a local printer)

A detailed breakdown of these tasks is available. David estimates that the overall average monthly work load is between 5 and 6 hours, but it is normally 4 hours, and at most 24 hours at busy periods. At those times you need to be comfortable about working to deadlines.

For payment, the administrator submits regular claims for payment based upon day-to-day expenses and hours worked to the treasurer ($\pounds 10$ per hour).

'Are numbers working for you?: using statistics in campaigns'.

Next year's conference will focus on a review of the work of the RadStats Group and RadStats members over the years and an examination of the effectiveness of using statistics in radical campaigns. We hope this will be an encouraging exercise that would also attract new members.
