The 2008 conference was held at a congenial venue and was very well attended. Its success can be seen from the full programme reported in these pages.

A summary is included here to save space. The AGM, attended by 22 people, included the usual business - the AGM 2007 minutes and reports on: membership, finances, essay competition, newsletter and website.

Two outgoing members of the troika, Shaelen Nandy and Geoffrey Rendle were thanked for their work. However, Geoffrey kindly offered to stay on an extra year to join Lee Williamson. Fortunately, Colin Clark – who had left early, later agreed to be the third member of the troika.

Discussion on funding led to a decision to maintain the full subscription level at $\pounds 15$ and keep a single category for concessionary subscriptions set at $\pounds 7$ - intended to allow unwaged people to become members. Donations will be encouraged.

Another motion was passed *nemcon* in support of the troika's earlier decision to remove two contributors from the RadStats email list.

Future newsletter: Social Exclusion Counted

Statistics on social exclusion change along with the changing discourses of our times. The driving agents in this process of change include government, lobbyists, and statistical experts. What is EuroStat's stance on social exclusion data?
