## The world has changed: 1985 to 2020

#### Technology and digital infrastructure

- computer processing time and data storage
- affordability and accessibility
- internet
- smart phones

#### Administrative data

- digital records and access
- data linkage

#### Proliferation of 'Big Data'

- phones, consumption, e-commerce, social media, service users, GPS, surveillance cameras
- Statistics





## Easier to get more data?

#### Data easier to access?

- Disclosure controls, data protection, secure data labs, data retention and destruction, data discontinued
- Risk assessment, time, bureaucracy and resources

#### National survey data?

 Falling response rates, lack of sub-regional data, seen as expensive, risk of discontinuation

#### Census?

- Individuals households small areas
- Rich source of socio-economic data, ethnicity, tenure, qualifications, demographics, workforce
- Resident, workplace, longitudinal
- An anchor point for sampling frames and weighting
- But Government seeking cost savings
- Replacement with administrative data???

#### Administrative data


- Major overhaul of social security system eligibility, entitlement, classification
- Working age benefits (WPLS, SHBE)
- Universal Credit
- NOMIS vs Stat-Xplore or ONS

- Quality, manipulated or false data?




### Ability to track long-term trends?
