- 2. Minutes of 2023 AGM accepted (all AGM minutes are available online)
- Journal editor's report Sean wants to step down, leaving Bob Jefferies, and Irina Motoc as book review editor. Steph D, David B volunteer to help.
  Speakers who were turned down because they could not attend should expect to hear from Conf24 organisers to share their presentations, and/or submit them as articles.

# AGM 24th February 2024

During 2024 the RadStats account experienced a deficit of £524. This was the result of paying for two conferences within the same calendar year. The deficit is manageable since subscriptions to RadStats and conference fees produce substantial income.

### Income

The income in 2023 from subscriptions was more than £400 more than that in 2022.

### Expenditure

RadStats' largest item of expenditure is the journal. The cost of the RadStats journal in 2023 was much less than in 2021 and 2022.

Most of the expenditure in the Administrative expenses line is postage for mailing the newsletter.

## The jiscmail list

The jiscmail list RADSTATS had 391 subscribers as of February 19. This makes it a useful facility for circulating information about meetings and other events of interest to Radical Statistics subscribers. It is worth bearing in mind that it is open to anyone irrespective of whether or not they have paid a subscription to Radical Statistics. So while there is an overlap, it has a separate function from the list RADSTATS-ANNOUNCE, which is used by our administrator to send messages to people who have actually paid a subscription.

It is less useful as a discussion facility as most of the messages sent to the list come from just one or two people and the remainder from a relatively small number. The vast majority of subscribers never post anything to the list. It would be good to hear from a wider range of subscribers with interesting and radical ideas, particularly younger people.

## Archiving

Some years back, the Wellcome Institute for the History of Medicine decided to invite radical science groups who had been active in the 1970s to deposit papers with it. Radical Statistics followed in the footsteps of out original umbrella group, the British Society for Social Responsibility in Science and (BSSRS) deposited quite a volume of material, mainly from the Health Group. As I was depositing other unrelated things as well as the Radical Statistics papers, everything was catalogued under my name. It was always intended to change this and show Radical Statistics material separately in the catalogue, but this hasn't yet happened.

We haven't archived anything recently, but the issue came up again when Roy Carr Hill's family offered us papers to archive and Radical Statistics couldn't be seen in the catalogue. More recently, Janet Shapiro's family offered Radstats material. This means that it is timely to return to the subject and think about what members want to archive, not only posthumously but while we are still alive! We also need advice about what and how to archive things in the electronic age.

Another issue which came up with Roy's donation was that it included copies of Radical Statistics. Periodicals belong in libraries rather than archives. The Wellcome Library has an incomplete run of older issues of Radical Statistics, donated by BSSRS. It was agreed that we should give the Wellcome Library copies of the missing issues and add it to the list of libraries to which we give complimentary copies.

So the proposals for this year's AGM are

- 1. We set up a small working group which will contact the Wellcome Archives to ask them to amend their catalogue to make Radical Statistics visible and advise us:
  - a. What sort of paper material we should deposit with them on an ongoing basis.
  - b. What sort of electronic material we should deposit with them on an ongoing basis and how.
  - c. Prepare guidance notes to be adopted at the next AGM
- 2. Contact the Wellcome Library to provide them with missing past copies of Radical Statistics and arrange for them to receive it free of charge in the future.

This means that this year we just need to look for volunteers for these jobs, rather than discuss the proposals themselves.
