STUDENTSHIP - SOCIOLOGY/STATISTICS

A University studentship is available for research towards a higher degree starting in Autumn 1978.

The grant is earmarked for a project on the use of statistics in the sciences beginning with an investigation of the variations in statistical practice evidenced in the published work of the different sciences.

The work, which will be jointly supervised from the sociology and the mathematics departments should lead to the award of an M.Sc or a Ph.D degree and would last for two or three years.

Candidates should have, or expect to have, a 2.1 or better in either sociology (in which case they should have a strong aptitude for mathematics/statistics) mathematics or statistics (in which case they should have a strong interest in the social sciences).

The Annual Conference of the Past and Present Society will be held on Friday, 29 September 1978, at the Geological Society of London, Burlington House, London WIV oJU. The meeting has been organized in conjunction with the British Society for the History of Science.

The theme of the Conference is the relationship between biomedical sciences and social thought from the late nineteenth century to the Second World War. The papers will be given by historians and historians of science on themes relating to the social function of scientific ideas. Professor John Maynard Smith and other scientists will provide a longer-term perspective on trends in sociobiology. It is intended that discussants will comment at length on themes related to the main papers. The papers and proceedings will be as follows:
