The Question of Race: a new BSSRS pamphlet

This pamphlet, subtitled "The case against including any question on race or ethnic origin in 1981" has just been published, and is available from BSSRS, 9 Poland Street, London, WIV 3DG (01-437-2728) for 10p + sae, or 90p for ten.

The pamphlet discusses the background to the ethnic question and discusses various possible wordings, as well as who wants the question and why. The objections listed include an unwillingness to enter "The numbers game", technical difficulties, its lack of usefulness for policy, possible misuse, and the threat it poses to black people. The "main danger" however is seen as "the fact that it legitimates race as a category for social policy".

Race Group News (Heather Booth)

For those of you who are unfamiliar with our activities, the Race Group has been working on the publication of a book on black people in Britain since May, 1978. The work is being done in conjunction with the Runnymede Trust. The book is (probably) to be called "Britain's Black Minorities" and covers the demography of the black population; the legislation concerning immigration and race relations; the position of black people in society including in education, employment, housing, health and social services; and the problems of dealing with statistics on race or ethnic origin.

Not a lot has actually happened since Nic Wright wrote the last piece for RSI5. Despite our carefully planned timetable aimed at publication in October, there have been various setbacks so that the publication date has been moved yet again and now stands at December, 1979. The final draft has finally been written and will be edited shortly by someone working in the field.

No-one from Radstats took up our invitation in RS15 to read the draft, nor did anyone request a formal Radical Statistics-acceptance-of-putting-name-on-publication meeting. The deed will thus be done.

We have abandoned our old name, REMIS standing for Race, Ethnic Minorities and Immigration Statistics (I think), in favour of Race Group. It is easier.
