Following the modest success of Reading Between the Numbers, the Education Group is thinking about a new project. One area we would like to explore is the relationship between resources and educational attainment. RBTN implies, in its criticism of 15000 Hours, that resources really do influence attainment, but Government ministers argue that no such link exists and therefore cuts are justified. Also, the conventional wisdom (apparently supported by research) is that pupils do not learn more in smaller classes — so there is no justification for reducing the pupil—teacher ratio and spending more on teachers. We would like to look critically at this proposition and produce data/models to refute it.

One kind of model we have in mind is educational attainment, measured by public examination results at LEA level, determined by LEA spending on secondary schools with allowance made for socio-economic differences between LEAs by using 1981 Census data. This is a 'between LEA' analysis, but it would, we believe, need to be supplemented by a 'between school within LEA' analysis.

('maxi project) The data for the former are available, but the data for the latter present problems.

The 'maxi' project we have in mind is ambitious and would be time-consuming. It is probably beyond the means of the four major authors of RBTN. ## Third World Health Statistics

Despite considerable interest and support for the project we have continued to find it difficult to focus attention on a practical target that we can tackle. This has led to a waning of enthusiasm at recent meetings. We have dug out some general information about the kind of data that is available, and its shortcomings, but any realistic approach would involve a detailed knowledge of a handful of countries, and a commitment to attack a particular problem. Those of us who have been able to meet regularly do not have the detailed experience to push us in the right direction.

For this reason we decided at the last meeting to shelve this project until someone comes up with a more specific suggestion that will regenerate enthusiasm. We'd like to thank all those who took an interest in the project, and those who helped us with support and information. It was all much appreciated, and we hope to provide a summary of our general findings in a future newsletter.

For the next few meetings we have decided to adopt a more relaxed attitude and simply have discussions, with no pressure to produce anything at the end of it. The first of these meetings will be on June 28th at the London School of Hygiene at 6.15pm when we shall be talking about Doll and Peto's 'The Causes of Cancer'. The following meeting (date to be arranged) will look at 'Health Care and its Costs', the DHSS's version of the development of the NHS over the last few years.

- 1. Jeff Evans and Alison Macfarlane had been to a meeting at CND about resources for peace education, The meeting had started on the premise that there was a dearth of these, but subsequent discussion revealed that there were quite a lot around. It was decided to get as many as possible together and display them at an information exchange! (low key exhibition) which it was hoped to arrange on July 1/2. At the same time it was planned to evaluate the materials and publish lists of those which could be recommended. - 4. It was decided not to hold the meeting which had been provisionally arranged for April 22 when we met in January, but to wait for response about proposed games.
