



A.G.M. BUSINESS MEETING, MARCH 24, 1984

- I. FINANCE: We have a balance of £620. Income from subscriptions last year amounted to £520.
- 2. BSSRS: We agreed to give a £40 donation as well as paying our annual subscription of £10. If BSSRS approaches us for more money it was agreed we could give a further £100. Any more than this will need further discussion by the Troika.
- 3. AFFILIATIONS: There was a proposal to affiliate to the Freedom of Information Campaign 1984 Group. Troika will check details and decide whether or not to join.
- 4. NEWSLETTER: Discussed having a 'Forthcoming Events' page where future meetings, AGM etc. could be listed.

 Have a standard page in each newsletter detailing sub-groups and saying they welcome new members.

 Decided to always decide on AGM date in time to publicise it in the autumn newsletter.
- 5. NEXT AGM: Date set for weekend of 23/24 February. Troika to discuss possibility of a 2 day AGM; Saturday- RS 10th birthday celebration, and public meeting; Sunday- business.

 Roy Carr-Hill volunteered to undertake a special mailing about the next AGM nearer the date.
- 6. DISTRIBUTION OF RS PUBLICATIONS: PDC owes RS £316, of which we are unlikely to get more than 20% back. We have put in a claim with the liquidators. We are pursuing the possibility of using XYZ distribution. Alison MacFarlane is going to let them know that we are interested in them distributing our publications.
- 7. NCCL: At the public meeting on the day before the AGM (at which a speaker from NCCL spoke) it was suggested that we had someone to liase with NCCL over various legal issues like the Data Protection Bill, Police Bill, Prevention of Terrorism Bill etc. Roy Carr-Hill volunteered to do this.
- 8. RECRUITMENT: We have a new RS leaflet, giving details of the group and what it does, publications etc. Troika is going to ask Science for People if they would include the leaflet in their next mailing.

 Various ideas were discussed for attracting new members and activists. Open meeting in the summer?
- 9. TROIKA: Many thanks to Heather Booth for her years of service on the Troika. Three new Troika members were appointed:
