

Misleading use of statistics - a series of broadsheets

With the next general election getting nearer, the party political machines are gearing themselves up to convince the electorate that they are right and everyone else is lying. As usual, statistics play a major role. The claims which are beginning to emerge, for example 'more nurses than in 1979', have an all too familiar ring, to us at least, but what about the public?

At the AGM, we discussed the proposal that we put together a series of 'broadsheets' to expose misleading uses of statistics on key topics. We have done this before. The Education Group produced an excellent four page broadsheet, illustrated with apposite cartoons, about schools league tables. In the run up to the 1992 general election, the Health Group produced a two page broadsheet challenging statistical claims of 'a growing health service'. This was less exciting graphically, and would have been more use if we had done it earlier, but it was circulated and used by sympathetic groups.

The AGM concluded that we should start now, tackle a larger range of subjects and think about how to circulate the broad sheets more widely. The Health Group already has a draft leaflet on the privatisation of the NHS and ideas for others, but more are needed. That is only one area of interest. We need volunteers to put together broad sheets on other subjects, education, crime, transport ... and so on.
